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## South High School Gets a Fabulous New Field House

*Thanks to Twin Cities LISC and the Minnesota Vikings,  
urban athletic complex goes from "Worst" to "World Class"*

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*Minneapolis, MN:* Minneapolis' South High School is celebrating the renewal of their much-maligned athletic facilities. After suffering the notoriety of being deemed the "worst athletic field in the city," in 2007 by the Minneapolis Star Tribune, they can now boast a world-class complex thanks in part to generous support from Twin Cities Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) and the Minnesota Vikings through the NFL's "Grass Roots" organization.

at Minneapolis' South High School at 3131 - 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue South, from 3:00 – 4:30 p.m.**

The need for a field house at South High has been on the radar of local high school sports enthusiasts for some time. Over the years, the field has been heavily used to support practices and games for four football teams, two soccer teams, two track teams, and serves as the location for daily physical education classes. The field was also made available to local community groups for use, but the lack of running water and with no rest rooms it was an unappealing option for most. South's fans and athletes alike were suffering. The "Friends of South High School" Foundation worked to raise money for four years, and came up with half of the dollar amount needed for the project. The NFL Grass Roots program, Twin Cities LISC and the Minnesota Vikings arrived just in time with the balance, and there will undoubtedly be a lot to cheer about at the South High Homecoming on October 9<sup>th</sup>.

LISC and the NFL contributed \$50,000 toward the total cost of \$100,000 for the new facility. The LISC-NFL Grass Roots partnership has supported the development six sports fields across Minnesota including Duluth, Minneapolis and St. Paul in the past several years.

"We are so happy to be a part of this terrific program," said Twin Cities LISC Executive Director Andriana Abariotes, "Our organization is committed to helping build and sustain strong communities. Bringing this project to fruition fits right in with our mission. This facility will help hundreds of students and staff to enjoy a state of the art sports complex for many generations to come. It's a tremendous boost to the school and entire surrounding community."

"To make this happen requires a lot of people to pitch in," stated Lester Bagley, Minnesota Vikings' Vice President of Public Affairs / Stadium Development. "This is our sixth venture with LISC and the NFL's Grass Roots program to improve fields and facilities to give children an improved place to play. The "Friends of South High School" are such a committed group of volunteers who care about the youth of the neighborhood and have been terrific to work with."

At 1,176 square feet, the new field house is an impressive new addition. Featuring ceramic tile throughout, new restrooms, polished concrete in the new concession area, ample storage for field maintenance and athletic equipment, and plenty of running water, South's athletes, friends and fans of the "Gallant Tigers" will enjoy these first-class amenities for many years ahead.

■ **About The NFL Youth Football Fund / Grassroots Program**
